One Health Aotearoa

A Centre for the prevention and control of infectious disease

- The One Health approach was received positively
- The proposal scored well, but was declined after the holistic assessment

One Health Aotearoa Activities Since the Unsuccessful CoRE Bid

- Increased collaborative research activities between Massey University and University of Otago
 - Staphylococcus aureus transmission modelling
 - Legionella genomics and transmission
 - Hazards associated with zoonotic enteric pathogens in emerging livestock meat pathways
 - Antimicrobial resistance
 - Foodborne infections
- Willingness for high-level engagement between the two universities based around One Health

One Health Symposia

- 9-10 September 2014
 Massey University, Wellington
- 22-23 March 2016
 University of Otago, Wellington
 - 172 participants from ~43 different institutions
 - 36 speakers from 15 different institutions

- Alliance of multiple New Zealand professions, disciplines and institutions with an interest in infectious diseases
- Working locally, nationally, and globally
- To attain optimal health for people, domestic animals, wildlife, and the environment

One Health principles

 Initiated by core group of individuals and institutions, but with intention to be an alliance involving any interested party


- National leadership in infectious diseases research, training and advocacy
